





TREASURER'S REPORT

The 2022-23 program year was a very successful one for AWCA's finances, thanks to both the generosity of our members and the care with which Board members managed their expenditures. After the award of our \$30,000 grant to the Arlington Free Clinic and payment of our expenses, we have a \$9,300 cushion to carry over to next year. This is not counting the funds received for next year's dues, which total \$4,550 so far. So, our current balance is almost \$14,000.

A review of our expenditures for the year shows most budget categories on target, although there have been increases in some expenses—notably the cost of our liability insurance and our PayPal fees, as more members take advantage of the option to pay online. I will share these figures with new Treasurer Emily Kiggen so she can plan for them in next year's budget.

SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Did you know that AWCA has a scholarship fund administered bv the Arlington Our Community Foundation? latest recipients, Mayerle Flores from Arlington Community High School and Heidy Sandoval from Washington-Liberty High School, were announced at the ACF scholarship reception June 1. Each will receive \$2000 to attend Northern Virginia Community College.

Launched in 2003, our fund has given out \$52,000 in scholarships through 2022. Applicants must be women who live in Arlington or graduate from an Arlington high school with a 3.0 GPA and plan to attend NOVA, with a preference for first-generation

college students or students who can demonstrate financial need. The scholarships are renewable up to three times to continue at NOVA or attend a four-year college. The ACF selects two new applicants each year for our scholarship as well as approving renewals for previous recipients who remain in good academic standing.

Although we last added money to the fund in 2008, the fund balance has remained healthy thanks to favorable market conditions. At the same time, tuitions have increased. So last year we increased our base scholarship amount from \$1000 to \$2000 and made the terms for renewal more flexible, allowing five years to use four years' worth of scholarship money. This year we will be supporting four continuing students--Lamiaa Bejjaoui and Maha Bouchareb at NOVA, Sierra Saunders at George Mason University, and Nurcan Cetinbas at Marymount University. So our total outlay may reach \$12,000 for the year.

Our current fund balance (before this year's grants are paid out) is \$44,501.77. With the greater amounts we are giving away, AWCA may need to consider whether to make additional donations to support our fund in the next few years.
